## New York State Assembly Speaker Carl Heastie Names Hevesi to Chairman of the Social Services Committee

Assemblyman Andrew Hevesi was appointed Chair the Assembly Standing Committee on Social Services this legislative session by New York State Assembly Speaker Carl Heastie. Formerly led by Assemblywoman Michele Titus, this committee reviews all key social services legislation before the Assembly, including financial, medical, and other support assistance for individuals

in need throughout New York State. The committee is also responsible for providing oversight for programs administered by the Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance (OTDA) and approves the state's multi-billion dollar funding allotment for social services each fiscal year.



Assemblyman Hevesi delivers the Keynote Address at the 2015 Supportive Housing Network Annual Meeting. The Supportive Housing Network represents 200 non-profit organizations that have created over 42,000 units of supportive housing across New York State. The Network uses their advocacy, training, research, and policy to increase the public's understanding of supportive housing, and to encourage the creation of enough supportive housing to address homelessness in New York. Hevesi spoke about several policy initiatives that seek to address New York City's increasing homeless population.
