Assemblyman Cymbrowitz Helps Constituent with Mobility & Reading

Adam N., who has cerebral palsy, desperately needed a replacement electric wheelchair to enable him to get around. The donated chair he was using was not a good fit and had become dangerous and unreliable. The government bureaucracy, however, refused to replace it. When Assemblyman Cymbrowitz learned of Adam's situation, he got involved and intervened with the NYS Department of Health, explaining Adam's unique circumstances. The bureaucrats agreed and Adam got a new chair. Adam also mentioned to Assemblyman Cymbrowitz that he wanted to strengthen his reading skills. With the assistance of Dr. Billy Katz, the Assemblyman arranged for Adam to attend a literacy program at Kingsborough Community College that will also afford him socialization opportunities.

You can tell from his smile that Adam N. is happy to show off his new electric wheelchair as his sister Susan N. and Assemblyman Cymbrowitz look on.


Hundreds Memorialize Holocaust at Holocaust Remembrance Day Ceremony

Over 350 students, their family members, teachers, and principals participated in Assemblyman Cymbrowitz' Holocaust Poetry, Essay, Performance, and Art Contest Awards Ceremony on Holocaust Remembrance Day. The morning's program was designed to provide contest winners with greater insight into the Holocaust. The audience was diverse, representing many nationalities, religions, and cultures. In addition to student performances, Holocaust survivors Ruth and Jack Gruener shared their personal experiences. The keynote speaker was New York State Comptroller Tom DiNapoli, who pointed out that we can never let our guard down because hatred continues to be a part of the makeup of the world. Assemblyman Cymbrowitz' Holocaust Contest asks students to study this horrific era, think about it, and then express their feelings using their creative talents. It has attracted thousands of entries from public and parochial schools, as well as yeshivas, over the past ten years.

- When National Grid upgraded the gas service on East 11th Street, it left a large, temporarily filled-in construction hole in front of homeowner Gean K.'s driveway and broken concrete next to his house. Not only was it difficult to get into his driveway and dangerous to walk on his side path, but water and litter were accumulating in the holes. Frustrated at getting no results after numerous calls to National Grid over a three month period, Gean K. contacted Assemblyman Cymbrowitz' office and the driveway and concrete problems were quickly corrected.
 - While disputing a Health Department violation that Ms. B. believed she didn't deserve, she was assessed with a late charge.

Assemblyman Cymbrowitz believed that it was unfair and after discussing this with the Health Department, Ms. B. received a refund for the late payment fee.

17-year-old Esther M. was seriously injured after being hit by a car.

The doctors told her family that the Rusk Institute would give her the best opportunity for recovery. Her insurance company wanted her transferred to a rehabilitation facility that did not have a good reputation for the type of therapy she needed. While her No Fault insurance coverage was acceptable to Rusk, they required secondary coverage. That coverage was Medicaid, which balked at paying for Rusk. Assemblyman Cymbrowitz contacted Medicaid, pointing out Rusk's track record for treating young patients with Esther's injuries. They agreed to pay for her rehabilitation at the Rusk Institute and she is on her way to recovery.

Joseph C. lives across the street from a medical building that kept the bright lights of its sign on all night interfering with his sleep.

After Assemblyman Cymbrowitz' office made the building's management aware of the problem they agreed to turn the lights off overnight.
