I've also recently won additional changes which means no bus lanes on Saturdays or Sundays.

As usual, I urge you again to communicate with me on this issue and any other, so that I will always be aware of your concerns.

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LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

NYS BUDGET WHICH PUTS FAMILIES FIRST, GETS YES VOTE FROM PERRY

Budget Highlights

Assemblyman Perry was joined by his colleagues in the Assembly Majority, in refusing to pass a state budget which was balanced on the backs of New York's working families. The 2016/17 budget is just not a spending plan, but rather a farreaching, comprehensive plan to put families first and strongly invest in New York's future. Below you will find some highlights of this year's budget.

Fight for \$15: The budget provides New Yorkers with a minimum wage increase that will help lift countless families out of poverty. The minimum wage in New York City will gradually increase, reaching \$15.00 an hour by Dec. 31, 2018.

Investing in our schools: A quality education is essential to a child's future success that's why the Assembly's budget proposal once again makes funding for our schools a top priority. The budget includes a record \$24.8 billion in education aid.

My Brother's Keeper: The budget allocates \$20 million for implementation of President Obama's My Brother's Keeper initiative; a first-in-the-nation statewide effort to address the opportunity gaps faced by young men of color.

Paid Family Leave: The budget gradually provides up to 12 weeks of paid leave benefits for workers who have been employed for at least six-months, to care for an infant, a family member with a serious health condition or to ease the burden placed on families when earners are called into active military service.

You May Not Know It, But! THIS IS THE LAW

You may not park within 15 feet of a fire hydrant: Unless a licensed driver is in the front seat so the vehicle may be immediately moved in the event of an emergency.

Don't follow that fire truck! -Following within 200 feet of a fire truck or any emergency vehicle which is responding to an emergency is against the law!

New York's "Move Over" law requires motorists on multi-lane highways to slow down and "move over" giving safe clearance to approaching stopped emergency vehicles with flashing lights. Failure to slow down and change lanes is a moving violation with penalties of 3 points and up to a \$150 fine. On single lane roads, motorists must slow down and use caution.

Don't Leave that Engine Running: It is illegal to let your vehicle idle for more than three minutes on a NYC street, or just one minute adjacent to a school. Potential fines range from \$100 to \$2000.

Stop for School Buses: Passing a stopped school bus with its red lights flashing in New York could earn you a minimum \$250 fine and five points on your driver's license. This law applies on all roads, in parking lots and even when you are driving on the opposite side of a divided highway.

Perry Bill Provides Easy Access to Rent Freeze for Seniors

Assembly bill (A.6702A/S.8063) sponsored by Assemblyman Perry will shortly be on the Governor's desk for his signature to become law. When enacted this bill will make it easier for Senior Citizen Rent Increase Exemption (SCRIE) eligible seniors and disabled New Yorkers (DRIE) to renew and extend their benefits.

The bill allows for current recipients of SCRIE/DRIE to apply with a short form after five years in the program.

Perry's Budget Vote Kills CUNY/SUNY Tuition Increases

Assemblyman Perry entered this year's budget negotiations with the mindset that New York State must do more to make college affordable. In a big victory, this year's budget put the needs of college students first.

"Every New York family has the right to an affordable college education," said Assemblyman Perry, as he voted to reject all tuition increases for the upcoming academic year. CUNY/SUNY also gets \$30 million more in operating aid for CUNY and SUNY schools to preserve the quality of education and protect vital programs. Assemblyman Perry is elated to report that the proposal to shift \$485 million of CUNY expenses to New York City, was canned, making sure New York City families don't have to unfairly foot the bill for state costs.

Perry's Advocacy Gives Meyer Levin School for the Performing Arts a Chance to Grow.

Bad news came for Meyer Levin School for the Performing Arts when they learned in early spring that they would be forced to give up a considerable amount of space to an incoming charter school slated to co-locate at the campus. Parents, students, and school leadership called on Assemblyman Perry for help, and they were not disappointed. Speaking at a public hearing Assemblyman Perry joined the school leadership, parents and students and challenged the proposal and vowed to fight with them to stop the Department of Education (DOE) from going through with its plan which would kill any future opportunities for the school to grow.

Assemblyman Perry kept his promise and launched a strong campaign to convince the DOE that they were wrong, and the only right thing to do was to withdraw the proposal. Working with the school, Assemblyman Perry developed

the information to back the challenge and convince the DOE that they were wrong and Meyer Levin was right, and DOE withdrew their plan.

Meyer Levin is now free to grow and admit students from the surrounding communities. A big win for Meyer Levin and Assemblyman Perry.

Free Exercise Program at Paerdegat Park- Assemblyman Perry's Community Health and Fitness Exercise Program operates May through October, from 6:00 a.m. to 8:00 a.m. at the Paerdegat Park basketball court on Albany Avenue between Farragut Road and Foster Avenue. Assemblyman Perry has secured state funds for the program since 2003.

At a recent community meeting regarding the looming L line shutdown, the MTA came to Canarsie to talk to residents about its impact, which is the only subway line that directly serves the residents of Canarsie. Assemblyman Perry asked why it took so long for them to come to Canarsie to speak about plans that had been in the pipeline for quite some time, and while they had spoken to other communities to be affected, seemingly forgotten Canarsie was one of the last neighborhoods to hear directly from them.

Technology Upgrades Coming at IS 211 -I.S. 211, once famous for having students produce their own TV programs, will once again be afforded that opportunity, thanks to state funding in excess of \$500,000 secured by Assemblyman Perry, which will fully rehabilitate the school's audio/video lab.

New School Bus for Brownsville Pre-K and After-school Program.

Inner Force Tots will receive a new school bus thanks to state funding secured by Assemblyman Perry. The bus will be used to pick up and transport students to and from the school's after-school and pre-K programs which educates students from Brownsville and other surrounding areas.
