My priority since day one has been to make New York a more equitable place for all. This year's budget supports that goal by investing in our neighborhoods, making important reforms to our criminal justice system, and an unprecedented commitment to New York City public schools.

This year was my first as Chair of the Committee on Libraries and Education Technology. I'm proud to say we pushed for and secured an extra \$10 million in capital library funding that will go towards critical repairs and improvements to our libraries statewide.

INVESTING IN OUR NEIGHBORHOODS

During this year's budget process, I worked hard to make sure New York's neighborhoods had the investments they needed to thrive. I took my first year as Chair of the Libraries and Education Technology Committee as an opportunity to empower our communities by increasing funding to our public library system.

For many New Yorkers, their local library is more than just a place to read, it's a lifeline into the community. They provide critical services -- helping immigrants learn English, students access coding classes, job seekers find employment opportunities.

In fact, public libraries are the only source of free Internet access in more than two-thirds

of New York's towns and cities. For many low-income families, the local library is the primary source of Internet access.

With this in mind, I fought to expand New York's commitment to our library system and support the role public libraries play in our everyday lives. I'm proud to report a total of \$24 million was approved in our most recently passed budget for capital library funding, representing an increase of \$10 million from last year.

With increased uncertainty at the federal level, we cannot put access to knowledge and information at risk. A strong library system means a strong New York.



Are you interested in public service? Would you like to learn more about the democratic process? Do you know a student that is? We are currently accepting applications for part-time interns in my Manhattan and Albany offices. Our internship program is designed to give insight

into the various paths of public service and provide the opportunity to be a part of the daily operations of a state legislator's office.

PRE-K FOR ALL

in need of critical investments for more classrooms to support our youngest learners.

As a father, I know that it's never too early to put our kids on a path to success. Our city officials must step up to help our children gain the skills and tools they need to reach their full potential.

HONORING A HERO

I was privileged to introduce FDNY Fire Fighter Jimmy Lee on the Assembly floor earlier this year. Fire Fighter Lee is an extraordinary individual, involved in one of the most difficult and daring rescues in recent memory.

Mr. Lee rescued an 81 year old gentleman who was pressed against a window on the fifth floor off a dangling rope literally seconds before that rope was eviscerated by fire.

I know I speak for all New Yorkers when I thank him for his service and courage.

STANDING UP FOR NEW YORKERS



New Yorkers have endured deteriorating subway conditions for far too long – it is unacceptable. Our city cannot adequately run without a reliable subway system.

These problems were not created overnight and they will not be solved overnight. We need a long-term commitment to New York City's transportation infrastructure problems. Quick fixes and a band-aid approach will simply not address a subway system that dates back over 100 years.


