On Thursday, October 12, Seawright and the New York City Department of Design and Construction (DDC) held a community information session for the residents of the Upper East Side who are anticipating the longdelayed reconstruction project to be completed in December. The reconstructed bridge will provide a link to and from the East River Esplanade. Initially, the project was supposed to be completed in 18 months but an unexpected need to retrofit the bridge's north abutment and design changes added and additional 13 months to the project.



The Centennial of Women's Suffrage

A Message from Rebecca Seawright

The right to vote is a shining example to the world of what democracy means and why it's so important. Voting is one of the strongest, most direct ways we can effect change. It's our chance to influence, inspire, make our voices heard and hold our leaders accountable. But not too long ago, women were denied the right to vote. This year marks the 100th anniversary of women's suffrage in New York State - three years before the ratification of the 19th Amendment.

New York has long been a national leader in the advancement of women's equality. The Seneca Falls Convention of 1848 - the nation's first to address women's rights - was organized by leading suffragists Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Lucretia Mott and set in motion a decades-long push toward women's suffrage. On Nov. 6, 1917, New York legalized women's suffrage.

It wasn't an easy journey, though. Women were considered far from equal, with many anti-suffrage arguments focused on a woman's supposed inability to think rationally, and some even declared that women didn't have time to vote or think about politics because they were too busy taking care of the home. But suffragists persevered nonetheless. They gave speeches in churches, convention halls, meeting houses and on street corners and circulated countless petitions. They also published newspapers, pamphlets and magazines to get their message out.

Now, as we celebrate the centennial of women's suffrage here in New York, we are not only reminded of what it took to get here, but also how far we still must go to achieve full women's equality. Today, safeguarding women's rights is more important than ever, and the Assembly Majority remains committed to doing just that. Not only do we have a federal administration that's threatening a woman's right to keep her reproductive health care decisions between her and her doctor, but, unbelievably, women still earn less than men for equal work.

This year, the Assembly Majority passed two critical pieces of legislation to strengthen and protect women's reproductive health rights. One measure affirms a woman's right to choose and the other requires insurers to continue covering FDA-approved contraceptives at no cost to the consumer (A.1748, A.1378). The Assembly Majority also passed workplace protections including the New York State Fair Pay Act to ensure pay equity among male and female workers and to ensure that jobs traditionally held by women are not undervalued (A.4696).

A century after women's suffrage was achieved in New York, our state remains a progressive leader on women's issues and equality, recognizing that each and every person deserves to be treated with respect and fairness no matter their race, sex, creed, nationality or sexual orientation. For the trailblazers that came before us, the activists that stand among us and the visionaries yet to come, may this anniversary serve as a spark for great strides forward in the march toward full women's equality.

New Yorkers can celebrate women's suffrage in a variety of ways, including attending workshops and galleries, visiting historic sites or reading more about our state's famed history. The New York State Women's Suffrage Commission, which was created to honor the fight for women's rights and pay tribute to pioneering suffragists and figures, has more information on its website at www.ny.gov/programs/new-york-state-womens-suffrage-commission.

Safety Tips for Children. What Can I Do?

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) reports that Halloween is consistently one of the top three days of the year for pedestrian injuries and fatalities. In addition, 48% of all motor vehicle crash fatalities on Halloween night in 2012 (latest available data) involved a drunk driver. And according to the Center for Disease Control, children ages 5 to 14 are four times more likely to be killed by a motor vehicle accident on Halloween than on any other day of the year.

Sound scary?

Keep costumes light and bright, so children are clearly visible to motorists and

It doesn't have to be. Parents should always emphasize safety precautions, and accompany children on their rounds after dark. Here are some guidelines to follow.motor vehicle accident on Halloween than on any other day of the year.



Costumes should be flame-resistant and fit properly. Be sure the child's vision is unobstructed by face masks, paint, or head gear like hats.



Costumes that are too long may cause kids to trip and fall. Trim or hem their costumes, as necessary. Children should wear sturdy, comfortable, slip-resistant shoes to avoid falls.

It is important that children walk on sidewalks and never cut across yards or driveways. They should also obey all traffic signals and remain in designated crosswalks when crossing the street.

This work will require a complete street closure from 6:00 AM Saturday through 9:00 PM Sunday on East 84th Street between York and East End Avenues.

Street Closure and Work Hours: October 21st and October 22nd

- Street closure signs will be posted at the corners of East 84th Street at York and East End Avenues one week in advance of the closing. Additional NYPD No Parking signs will appear 48 hours prior to the street closure.
- Please note: in advance of this work commencing, all vehicles must be temporarily relocated from the street prior to 6AM Saturday, October 21st, or your vehicle will be towed. - Preparatory work (fence and barricade removal) will begin on Friday October 20, but will not require any lane closings. Two hydraulic assist cranes will remain in place overnight Saturday/Sunday. Security guards will be present 24/7 from Friday morning through Sunday night to patrol the worksite.
- Work hours on Saturday and Sunday will be between 7:00 AM and 9:00 PM. Towing and other site mobilizations will begin at 6:00 AM.

Please note that information pertaining to crane logistics and operations can be found on Chapin's website - *www.chapin.edu/buildingproject* - and will be continually updated.

Please also note the crane delivery and installation dates could change due to inclement weather. In the event of a weather delay, we will send another electronic notification on the morning of October 21st noticing our neighbors that the work is postponed.
