




Dear Neighbors,

Lake Taghkanic

Lake Taghkanic State Park, along Lake Taghkanic in Columbia County, offers tent and trailer campsites, as well as cabin and cottage camping facilities. Mills Norrie State Park




James Baird State Park

Taconic State Park features two developed areas for camping and hiking in the Taconic Mountain Range near Copake Falls in Columbia County. For more information, call 518-329-3993.



Rail Trails

Harlem Valley Rail Trail

The Harlem Valley Rail Trail runs through eastern Dutchess and Columbia counties and currently includes 15 miles of paved trails through beautiful rural countryside, with more sections opening. Visit hvrt.org for more information and a map of the trail.



Dutchess Rail Trail

Beginning in Hopewell Junction and running northwest, the Dutchess Rail Trail offers 13 miles to walk, run, cycle or blade, linking the Walkway Over the Hudson with trails on the other side of the river. Visit co.dutchess.ny.us/countygov/ departments/dpw-parks/17055. htm for more information.

Home of Franklin D. **Roosevelt National Historic Site**

Clermont State Historic Site


The Clermont State Historic Site is the former estate of the Livingston family, a prominent New York State family for several generations. Olana State Historic Site


The Olana State Historic Site outside of Hudson was the home of artist Frederic Edwin Church from 1860 to 1900. Eleanor Roosevelt National Historic Site

Once home to Eleanor Roosevelt, this National Historic Site, also known as "Val-Kill," is the only site dedicated to a First Lady. Tours of the Hyde Park home are offered yearround and visitors can access gardens, grounds and trails. For more information and tour schedules, visit nps.gov/elro or call 845-229-9422.

Staatsburgh State Historic Site

This historic country home of Ogden Mills and his wife Ruth Livingston Mills is another stunning example of a Gilded Age (1876-1917) estate. Vanderbilt Mansion National Historic Site



County Parks

Wilcox Memorial Park

Route 199, Milan

This family friendly park offers a sandy beach, two small lakes, paddle or row boat rentals, mini-golf (available in season), a snack bar located on the lower lake – and even a resident heron, one of the many beautiful birds in the park to look out for. Drowned Lands Swamp Conservation Area

653 County Route 3, Ancram

The Drowned Lands Swamp features 114 acres, with 1.5 miles of trails. The conservation area offers woodlands, meadow, wetlands and a perennial stream, including portions of one of the largest wetland complexes in southeastern New York. Greenport Conservation Area

319 Joslen Blvd., Greenport The Greenport Conservation Area features 625 acres of upland meadows, deciduous forests and an estuarine wetland. Bowdoin Park

85 Sheafe Road, Wappingers Falls Bowdoin Park is a 301-acre park located on the banks of the Hudson River in the town of Poughkeepsie. The park offers picturesque views, areas for picnicking, a water spray park and a handicapped-accessible playground area. The park also offers soccer, baseball and softball fields and a nationally recognized cross-country race course. The High Falls Conservation Area features the tallest waterfall – at 150 feet – in Columbia County. The conservation area offers 47 acres that include trails, forest, access to Agawamuck Creek and a picnic bench. Palatine Park



Beatrix Farrand Garden at Bellefield

Now over 100 years old, this classic garden is a stunning example of the work of Beatrix Farrand, one of the most celebrated landscape gardeners of the first half of the twentieth century. This Italian villa overlooks the Hudson River and is surrounded by acres of restored and revitalized grounds, gardens and carriage roads.
