# SUCCESSES IN THE 108TH DISTRICT

### Regional Economic Development Council Awards

Governor Andrew Cuomo announced the Regional Economic Development Council (REDC) awards on December 10th. The Capital Region received \$98.1 million, of which our district received \$27.7 million. The projects that received awards were diverse and creative, ranging from small business incubators to rehabilitating historic buildings. ### Water Infrastructure Improvement Grants

In order to upgrade and modernize infrastructure for clean drinking water, Governor Cuomo distributed grant money across the state to municipalities with aging water systems. Between Rensselaer, Troy, and Albany, the 108th district received \$18.5 million in grants and loans to invest in improved water quality.



## Plastic Bag Ban and Fee




(b) If you said "no" to question (a), would you change your answer if 5 cents of that fee would be used to fund our state parks?

### 5 Cents to State Parks










5. (a) Should we increase the minimum wage to \$15 an hour statewide for fast-food employees (i.e. employees of fast food companies with 30 or more locations)?

### **Fast Food Minimum Wage**




(b) Should we introduce legislation to help lessen the impact of a potential minimum wage increase on our small businesses?

**Minimum Wage Support for Small Businesses** 




6. Do you believe students' state standardized test scores should make up a significant part of a teacher's performance evaluation?




7. Should 16 and 17-year-olds charged with a crime be able to be tried as adults?

16 and 17 year olds charged as adults




8. (a) Do you believe the state should appoint a special prosecutor to investigate the death of unarmed individuals who died at the hands of law enforcement officers?




(b) Should the position of such a special prosecutor be a permanent one?


### **Special Prosecutor-Permanent**




Should the state erase misdemeanor convictions for possessing a small amount of marijuana for personal, nonmedical use provided that the person convicted does not reoffend for 12 months?




10. Would you support increased state funding for home health aid if it were to increase your taxes?



### **Funding Home Health Aides**




