LEGISLATIVE SPOTLIGHT

This past March, I introduced a bill to help veterans exposed to Agent Orange that extends the deadline to sue the chemical's producers. More conditions and diseases are now believed to be associated with exposure to Agent Orange, including Hodgkin's disease, prostate cancer, adult-onset diabetes mellitus (Type II), Parkinson's disease, ischemic heart disease, non-Hodgkin's lymphoma and respiratory cancers.

In May, I authored legislation to extend the Environmental Protection Agency's (FPA) Pesticide Container Repair Interim Policy, which passed the Assembly. The policy, released in 2009, allows New York retailers to make minor repairs to damaged pesticide product containers to eliminate unnecessary waste, provided the repairs are approved by the EPA. Additionally, I authored a piece of legislation this summer that limits denial of coverage of additional treatment to health care services for which pre-authorization is required and was granted. This bill helps ensure patients receive medically necessary services when they are in a medically compromised state and prevents plans from delaying or denying necessary treatment on the sole basis that they were not specifically prior authorized.

Later in the month, the Assembly passed legislation I vocally supported that aims to address the growing problem of abandoned residential properties due to foreclosure in our communities, also known as "zombie properties." To combat these growing problems and to protect the rights of homeowners, this legislation would allow homeowners to challenge

Flood Maps Extended

The federal government recently added 876 properties to Syracuse's flood zone. This means that if you are a property owner with a mortgage that is in this zone, you will have to purchase flood insurance. There was a workshop held at the Southwest Community Center on September 8 with representatives from DEC and FEMA to help people identify if their property will fall into the new zone and walk them through the appeals process.

the legality of a foreclosure proceeding at any point during the foreclosure process and would clarify the law regarding mandatory settlement conferences, which are often critical in negotiating better outcomes in order to preserve homeownership.

I had the opportunity to witness the Governor signing the bill into law right here in Central New York. I'm pleased to announce the Attorney General has made \$13 million available to the state to help combat this problem.



Additionally, the town of Onondaga will be having a public hearing on September 19 at 5 p.m. at the Onondaga Town Hall to discuss the Flood Map changes in the area. STATE BUDGET UPDATE

Joining with advocates and legislators from around the state, I was able to deliver for Central New York in this year's state budget. Here are some of the highlights:

- **\$200,000 for deer population control in Syracuse and DeWitt** to finally solve a persistent issue in our community that puts residents and drivers at risk.
- **\$36 million in new aid for our schools**, including ending the Gap Elimination Adjustment (GEA) once and for all.
- An increase in the minimum wage statewide. For CNY, that means the wages of working people will be raised to \$12.50 per hour by the year 2020.
- By 2021, full-time workers will qualify for 12 weeks of paid family leave to help care for their loved ones during emergencies without putting their livelihood at risk.
- Freezing tuition increases at SUNY colleges to help our students achieve the dream of higher education.
- Middle-class tax cuts totaling \$3 billion over seven years.
- **\$28 million to combat the heroin epidemic**, because when Onondaga County is number one in overdose deaths statewide, our representatives have to act.
- A return to parity for upstate transportation infrastructure, ensuring that roads and bridges in Central New York get the attention they need.



Fight the Bite CNY

My office attended the "Fight the Bite" Forum at the Carrier Theatre in Downtown Syracuse. This event, sponsored by the Onondaga County Health Department, explained the many dangers and causes of tick and mosquito-related diseases, and how to prevent them. In New York State there are 30 species of ticks, 10 of which bite humans.

TICK TIPS

- 1. Using a pair of pointed tweezers, grasp the tick right where it enters the skin.
- 2. With a steady hand, firmly pull upward to remove the tick.
- 3. Place the tick in a container of rubbing alcohol to kill it.
- 4. Use rubbing alcohol or hydrogen peroxide to clean the wound.
- 5. For the next 30 days, keep an eye on the site of the bite and check for a rash.
- 6. If a rash appears or you come down with flu-like symptoms, immediately contact a medical professional.

District Tour with Speaker Heastie



CNY STEM Hub Summer Camp for Young Women Powered by AT&T

In July, I spoke to the 30 exceptional girls who took part in the CNY STEM Hub Summer Camp for Young Women Powered by AT&T. The weeklong camp at Le Moyne College encouraged the students to enter the male-dominated field and equipped them with useful hands-on skills. The team-based projects, which involved fields such as coding, robotic engineering and computer science, were all aimed at benefiting the girl's schools and communities. More than 50 percent of the girls attend at-risk high schools, so programs like this one are important to helping them combat economic barriers.

YWCA Tour

In August, I had the pleasure of taking a tour of the YWCA complex on Douglas Street. The YWCA is a place for women to seek educational opportunities through enrichment programs, in addition to providing affordable youth development programs and safe housing for low-income women. I also served as a judge for the Girls, Inc. "DreamBuildHER" closing ceremony, an entrepreneurship program that encourages women to come up with new ideas that can improve certain businesses and products.
