BILL A6569 - PASSES ASSEMBLY

AN ACT TO AMEND CHAPTER 395 OF THE LAWS OF 1978, RELATING TO MORATORIUMS ON THE ISSUANCE OF CERTIFICATES OF ENVIRONMENTAL SAFETY FOR THE SITING OF FACILITIES AND CERTIFICATION OF ROUTES FOR THE TRANSPORTATION OF LIQUEFIED NATURAL OR PETROLEUM GAS, IN RELATION TO EXTENDING THE EFFEC-TIVENESS OF THE PROVISIONS OF SUCH CHAPTER





ASSEMBLY ASSISTANT MAJORITY LEADER CHARLES D. FALL STATEMENT ON THE FATAL SHOOTING OF 13 YEAR OLD JAMOURE HARRELL

"We are heartbroken as a community by the news of this tragic shooting. As we navigate through this difficult time, please keep the family, friends, classmates, teachers, and loved ones of Jamoure in your prayers. We cannot tolerate these senseless acts of violence any longer. Our children deserve to live out their childhood.

I have two daughters and upon hearing this news, I wanted nothing more than to go find them and hug them. Through our grief and anger we must come together and find solutions to combat gun violence. Our children need guidance and support now more than ever. We must be just as intentional with our actions as we are with our words. I am committed to working with the community, my colleagues and law enforcement in exhausting every option to ensure that we don't lose another child. My team and I have been in contact with the Harrell family and are ready to provide support in any way we can. Let's all continue to lift up our community so that we see an end to this violence that plagues us."

Battery Park City South Neighborhood Walking Tour Jun 16

Reservations for the public open on June 1. Skyscraper Museum members may register now by emailing programs@skyscraper.org. Tickets for remaining spaces will be open to the public on June 1st at 12pm. See below for more info.

The tour explores Battery Park City's southern district, which is home to the Skyscraper Museum and includes some of BPC's earliest landscapes and infrastructure, as well as the residential enclaves built in the 1990s that followed the 1979 Cooper Eckstut Master Plan. We will visit historic Pier A and South Cove, as well as the green spaces that connect to the Esplanade, the first waterfront park in New York since the Brooklyn Heights Esplanade in 1951, and learn about the developing Resilience Action Plan of BPCA, which has led to the temporary closure of Wagner Park.

This tour will meet at The Skyscraper Museum, **39 Battery Pl**. Registration for each tour is limited to **50** people. Confirmation emails will be sent 2 days before the event and must be confirmed by 24 hours before the event, or the reservation will be cancelled. Any updates for bad-weather cancellations will be sent to your email address.

Governor Hochul Announces More Than \$47 Million to Provide Summer Jobs for Disadvantaged Youth

Governor Kathy Hochul today announced that more than \$47.1 million will be available to support New York State's Summer Youth Employment Program this year, helping an estimated 18,500 young New Yorkers gain valuable experience in the workforce. Administered by the State Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance, this program introduces young people from low-income families into the labor market so they can develop useful skills that will help them improve educational performance and become responsible adults.

"For so many young people, having a summer job is a rite of passage that helps them gain valuable skills and their first experiences in the workplace," Governor Hochul said. "The Summer Youth Employment Program provides invaluable experiences for young people from lowincome households, teaching them responsibilities that can help them excel in careers later in life." "With this investment, we're ensuring our teens and young adults have equitable access to job opportunities, training, and workforce experience," said Lieutenant Governor Delgado. "We must support historically underserved communities, provide resources for families statewide, and put our kids on the path to success."

The Summer Youth Employment program supports communities across the state in creating summer jobs for youth from low-income families. Participants work in entry-level jobs at places such parks, summer camps, child care organizations, cultural centers, educational facilities, and community-based organizations, among others.

To be eligible for the 2023 program, young people must be between ages 14 to 20 and have a household income below 200 percent of the federal poverty level or \$49,720 for a family of three. The program served more than 18,500 youth in 2022, providing them with valuable workforce experience, and often results in improved academic performance afterward.
