INTRODUCTION

The 1999 Catalog of Workforce Preparation Programs contains information on 70 State and federally funded programs, representing an investment in the workforce of over \$1 billion. These programs provide education and training activities and services to employed and unemployed adults and youth.

Employment Trends

Although the total population of New York State decreased between 1997 and 1998, the size of the laborforce grew slightly to approximately 8.8 million people.¹ Shifts in the composition of the laborforce reflecting socio-demographic changes among participants have been documented throughout the decade. When comparing Current Population Survey data from 1990 and 1998, women account for a greater percentage of the laborforce--up from 43.9% to nearly 47%--although the rate of growth has slowed from that during the 1980s. Between 1997 and 1998, the rate of laborforce participation for women remained the same. It is significant that the State's workforce continues to age. The percentage of workers in the laborforce who are between the ages of 25 and 44 has declined from 53% in 1997 to 51.8% in 1998. Workers aged 45 and over make up a larger share of the workforce, increasing from 34.7% in 1997 to 35.7% in 1998.

There are changes in the workplace environment as well. Technological transformation and the global economy have altered workers' lives. Overall, the need for advanced levels of education and training is expected to greatly increase. According to the chief economist for the U.S. Department of Labor (USDOL), "[t]echnology skills are becoming increasingly essential in today's workplace. So much so, that at least half the entry-level jobs for people who have not graduated from college involve computer use."²

Today's workers, whether new or experienced, must engage in a continuing process of developing their skills and abilities to perform effectively in changing work environments. "Futurework," a recent report issued by the USDOL, predicts that within a few years, "Most workers will need basic computer skills to enter their chosen occupations and additional specialized training in field-specific applications to advance." Workers and employers need to be increasingly informed about available and emerging employment and training options in order to make decisions

that will ensure both their short- and long-term success.

National employment trends, described by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS), reveal the increasing significance of the high-tech sector in the economy. High-tech employment increased 13% compared to 20% growth in employment for the economy as a whole over the 1986-96 period, while projections for the 1996-2006 period show high-tech and related employment growing more than twice as fast as employment in the economy as a whole. For the latter period, high-tech is expected to account for 29% of all projected employment growth.³

The fastest growing occupations in New York, through 2005, will be in health and computer related fields.⁴ The number of new jobs for computer engineers, computer scientists, systems analysts/electric data processors, computer support specialists and database administrators will just about double in the next decade. Although the fastest-growing professions are not where most job creation will take place, most new jobs will require some facility with technology. The use of computers is commonplace in almost all work environments, and manufacturing, retail and health care positions are being transformed by technology. According to the BLS, between 1996 and 2006, jobs requiring the most education and training will grow faster than jobs with lesser education and training requirements. Furthermore, the rate of growth in occupations requiring a bachelor's degree or more will be almost double that expected for occupations requiring less education and training.

Workforce Programs

There is another significant public issue in workforce development. In 1998, the federal Workforce Investment Act (WIA) was signed into law. The Act restructures workforce development programs into an integrated workforce investment system that can respond to the needs of current workers, the unemployed, workers laid-off due to restructuring or downsizing, and new entrants to the labor force, as well as employers. The State must be in compliance with WIA by July 1, 2000 when its predecessor, the federal Job Training Partnership Act (JTPA) expires. The State must submit and prepare a comprehensive five-year plan by April 1, 2000. Key principles of the new system include universal access for all job seekers, a one-stop service delivery system, and training services that will be provided through vouchers.
