Dear Friends,

The 2023 Legislative Session brought forth many budgetary and legislative accomplishments for the 1st Assembly District. I was proud to have 23 of my prime-sponsored bills pass through both Houses of the State Legislature. That is the third highest of the 150-member Assembly.

### Highlights of my 2023 local priorities include:

#### **Welcoming New York State Assembly Speaker Carl E. Heastie**

New York State Assembly Speaker Carl E. Heastie joined me for a tour of the East End. This visit presented a valuable opportunity to showcase the unique beauty, agriculture, and thriving industries of the region, while engaging in discussions on the issues that matter most to the community. The Speaker announced a \$250,000 funding allocation to support the Bridgehampton Child Care and Recreational Center's Pre-K program and directed \$1.75 million to the Town of East Hampton to supplement funds raised by the Montauk Playhouse Community Center Foundation for the completion of the Montauk Playhouse's aquatics and cultural center project.

### **Modernizing Village Incorporation Procedures**

The incorporation of a new village can have significant tax and fiscal impacts on taxpayers in both the proposed village and throughout the town in which a new village is to be located. However, the Village Law currently does not require any assessment of these costs before a public vote. This has led to disappointment and disillusionment as evidenced by the ultimate dissolution of two incorporated villages in my Assembly District.

Legislation that I sponsored, A.7754 and A.7761, was approved by the Legislature and will soon be sent to the Governor for consideration that will ensure voters have all the information necessary to make an informed decision before a vote on village incorporation is put to public referendum in the proposed incorporated area.



The third-party management model that the Long Island Power Authority (LIPA) has used for decades, currently with PSEG-LI, has failed time and again. Making LIPA the transparent and accountable public utility that the ratepayers have long deserved has been one of my top legislative priorities. Last year, I led the fight to establish the Legislative Commission on the Future of LIPA to develop and present to the Legislature an action plan to transition LIPA into a true public power provider. I was appointed a co-chair of the Commission by the Assembly Speaker.

After extensive public hearings and independent professional investigations, the Commission's final report returns to the original vision of public power when LIPA was created by the Legislature in 1986. The report demonstrates the potential to save over \$500 million over the next decade while reforming the LIPA Board through the appointment of five members by local governments and the creation of a Community Stakeholder Board. Accountability, oversight and transparency will be enhanced while eliminating costly outside management fees. These public benefits can be realized while still protecting the rights and benefits of our respected local workforce.

Legislation will have to be enacted in 2024 to implement the report's recommendations.

#### Helping East End Ocean Rescue Teams Recruit and Retain Volunteers

(Chapter #564 and #563 of the Laws of 2023)

My legislation was enacted to authorize the Town of East Hampton and the Village of Southampton to provide health insurance coverage for enrolled members of East Hampton Volunteer Ocean Rescue and Southampton Volunteer Ocean Rescue, respectively. This benefit is currently afforded to their emergency responder counterparts in the volunteer fire and volunteer ambulance services.



On June 8th, I was joined by Senator Kevin Thomas in welcoming Dawn Nappi to the State Capitol upon the passage of our legislation entitled "Angelica's Law." Dawn is the mother of Angelica Nappi, who was tragically killed by a driver operating a motor vehicle with seven prior license suspensions in 2008. If signed into law by the Governor, "Angelica's Law" will decrease from ten to five the number of prior suspensions imposed for moving violations needed to qualify for a Class E felony of aggravated unlicensed operation in the first degree.


## **Shelter Island Library - Saving Taxpayer Dollars**

(Chapter #215 of the Laws of 2023)

Legislation that I sponsored was signed into law making the Shelter Island Public Library eligible to receive financing through the Dormitory Authority of the State of New York for capital improvement projects, including its most recent expansion plan approved by the voters on June 17th.

Amidst the current severe housing crisis facing our region, I applaud the Governor for signing into law my legislation to expand manufactured homeowners' right of first refusal when the park in which they reside is put up for sale (Chapter #593 of the Laws of 2023). The new law affords residents a fair opportunity to purchase their park and provide housing security for their community.

# 113 Years and Counting -"We Are Still Here!"

The governor has once again rejected the pleas of Montaukett Indians by vetoing my legislation (A.6919, Veto #61 of 2023) that would have reversed a 1910 State Supreme Court decision (*Pharaoh v. Benson*) that wrongfully declared the Montauk Indian Nation to be extinct while their leaders and 75 members of the nation sat in the court room. I have long fought to correct this injustice and will continue to work beside the Montauketts to overcome this latest blow that, ironically, was issued during National Native American Heritage Month this past November.
