## Pioneers of the Women's Movement



#### **SOJOURNER TRUTH** (c. 1797 – 1883)

Born in Rifton, New York, Sojourner Truth traveled the country delivering passionate speeches against the evils of slavery and advocated for suffrage. She delivered her

famous "Ain't I a Woman?" speech at the Women's Rights Convention in Akron, Ohio, in 1851.

#### **SUSAN B. ANTHONY** (1820 - 1906)

One of the most prominent suffragists in U.S. history, Susan B. Anthony advocated for abolition and suffrage, founded the National American Woman Suffrage

Association with Elizabeth Cady Stanton and was integral in the passage of the 19th Amendment, which was named the Susan B. Anthony Amendment in her memory.



Bessie Blount Griffin was a pioneer in the field of medical science. As a physical therapist, she helped rehabilitate countless World War II veterans who had lost limbs and needed to

relearn skills. She also invented game-changing assistive devices to help them regain independence, including the first electric device allowing amputees to feed themselves without assistance. Outside of her medical career, she wrote columns for African American newspapers and worked as a forensic scientist.

#### **HELEN KELLER** (1880 – 1968)

Helen Keller, who lost her vision and hearing before her 2nd birthday, was a self-described "militant suffragette" and labor activist. She pa

suffragette" and labor activist. She participated in the 1913 Woman Suffrage Procession in Washington, D.C., joined the radical Industrial Workers of the World (IWW) and supported expanding access to birth control.

## **DR. MABEL PING-HUA LEE** (c. 1896 – 1966)

Born in Guangzhou, China, Dr. Mabel Ping-Hua Lee moved to New York City at age 11 and joined the suffrage movement, despite the fact that the Chinese Exclusion Act barred

most Chinese immigrants from voting until 1943. She led a 10,000-person parade for women's suffrage in New York City in 1912 on horseback and wrote feminist essays for The Chinese Students' Monthly.




#### JUSTICE KETANJI BROWN JACKSON (1970 – )

Born in Washington, D.C., Ketanji Brown Jackson earned her juris doctor degree from Harvard Law School in 1996, completed three prominent federal

clerkships and had a successful career as a public defender. In 2022, she was appointed the first Black woman to serve on the U.S. Supreme Court.

#### IDA B. WELLS (1862 - 1931)

Ida B. Wells was a journalist and anti-lynching advocate who wrote extensively about the South and owned two newspapers. She was also



#### **ELLA FITZGERALD** (1917 – 1996)

Throughout her decades-long career, jazz and swing singer Ella Fitzgerald established herself as an icon of American music. Dubbed "The First Lady of Song," she was the first woman to win multiple Grammy awards and, in 1967, she became the first woman to receive the Grammy Lifetime Achievement Award. She worked to end segregation in the music industry, establishing and supporting many nonprofit organizations. In 1987, she was awarded the National Medal of Arts.

#### **DOLORES HUERTA** (1930 - )

Dolores Huerta was a leader of the Community Service Organization (CSO), where she worked with Executive Director César Chávez to advocate for Hispanic workers and organize voter registration drives. The pair then founded the National Farm Workers Association, which merged with another group to form the United Farm Workers of America in 1966. She is still an active organizer, establishing the Dolores Huerta Foundation in 2003.
