Updates From Albany

I am proud to announce that this week our State Legislature passed a historic \$212 billion budget to jump start New York's economic recovery due to the COVID-19 Pandemic.

- The overall budget was positively impacted by federal aid that was passed on March 11, 2021.
- \$2.3 billion in federal funds to help tenants late on rent.
- \$1 billion in grants and tax credits for small businesses that suffered from the economic downturn.

Major Highlights:

- Once again, this year the Staten Island resident toll rate was protected and enhanced.
 - \$5.2 million was restored to keep the resident toll discount intact and keep the rate at \$2.75.
- Helping to stop gun and other violence:
 - Provides \$20 million for state and local crime reduction and youth justice and gang prevention programs.
 - Proposes \$8.5 million in additional funding for programs to combat gun violence.
 - Establishes the Community Violence Intervention Act, a community violence grants program within the OVS that requires a minimum of 10% of the federal Victims of Crimes Act (VOCA) funds awarded to OVS be dedicated to community-based violence intervention programs and hospital-based violence intervention programs.
 - Provides \$1 million in additional funding for the American Red Cross for a total of \$4.3 million
- Securing Communities Against Hate Crimes (SCAHC):
 - Adds \$25 million to the Securing Communities Against Hate Crimes grant program.
 - This program boosts safety and security at New York's nonpublic schools, community centers and day care facilities at risk of hate crimes or attacks because of their ideology, beliefs or mission. This new funding may also be used to safeguard against cyber related hate crimes or attacks.
 - Funding for Staten Island Legal Services-\$200,000.
- Higher Education/College of Staten Island:
 - With passage of \$100 million for CUNY expansion projects, CSI will be receiving funding for restorations, repairs and security lighting.
 - Rejected the executive proposal to reduce funding by \$46.4 million for SUNY and \$26.2 million for CUNY

- Includes \$20 million in federal funds for each of the next two years for scholarships to cover non-tuition expenses such as housing, meal plans and books, and help close the affordability gap.
- Allocates \$88 million to increase the maximum Tuition Assistance Program (TAP) award by \$500 for a maximum award total of \$5,665.
- Commits to pay off the TAP gap at SUNY and CUNY by the 2024-25 academic year.
- The TAP gap is the difference between TAP funding for students and actual tuition costs.
- Since 2011, New York's public colleges have had to cover this difference for students who qualify for the maximum TAP award, forcing them to dip into their operating budgets.
- The final budget rejects proposed tuition increases at SUNY and CUNY.
- Provides \$24 million to increase community college base aid by \$50 per full-time equivalent student and to reestablish the 98% guaranteed funding base level for community colleges statewide.
- For the 2021-22 academic year, the final budget provides an additional \$19 million for SUNY community colleges and \$5.6 million for CUNY community colleges.
- Human Services:
 - Camelot of Staten Island receives \$25,000.
 - Human Services Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) which includes \$46.2 million to provide a 1 percent COLA to not-for-profits licensed, certified, or otherwise authorized by OPWDD, OMH, and OASAS.
 - Accepts the executive proposal providing \$53.4 million to support the creation of new service slots, including expanding certified housing supports, community habilitation, respite services, housing subsidies, self-direction services, day programs and employment options.
 - Restores \$20.82 million for Care Coordination Organizations (CCOs) rates.
 - Restores \$12 million for local assistance payments for non-Medicaid payments under OPWDD.
 - Restores \$5.25 million for the fee-for-service Medicaid rate for OPWDD programs.
 - Provides \$1.2 million for various initiatives for those with intellectual and developmental disabilities.
 - Restores \$1 million to prevent the consolidation of the Institute for Basic Research in Developmental Disabilities (IBR) with the NYS Psychiatric Institute (NYSPI).
 - Establish Urgent Care Centers for mental health and addiction services.
- Supporting small businesses and fueling economic recovery:
 - Establishes the COVID-19 Pandemic Small Business Recovery Grant Program

- The Empire State Development Corporation (ESDC) would administer the program, providing grants and technical assistance to small businesses and microbusinesses of less than 10 employees that experienced economic hardship during the pandemic
- The grant program would also give priority to socially and economically disadvantaged business owners including, but not limited to, **minority and women-owned business enterprises**, service-disabled veteran- owned businesses, and veteran-owned businesses, or businesses located in communities that were economically distressed prior to March 1, 2020, as determined by the most recent census data
- Grants could be used to cover various business costs, including payroll, rent, mortgage, property and school taxes, insurance, utilities and pandemic-related expenditures that were necessary to protect the health and safety of workers and consumers
- Requires ESDC to issue quarterly reports to the Legislature detailing the program's progress and activities beginning Sept. 31, 2021
- Authorizes ESDC to provide multi-lingual technical assistance and outreach to all applicants regardless of approval status
- Provides \$1 billion for a business relief package which includes:
 - \$800 million in flexible aid for small-business grants (The COVID-19 Pandemic Small Business Recovery Grant Program)
 - \$100 million for a musical and theatrical production credit
 - An additional \$40 million for the Arts Recovery Grant Program for not-for-profit arts and cultural organizations
 - \$35 million in tax credits for restaurants in areas impacted by enhanced COVID restrictions
- Housing and Rental and Landlord Assistance:
 - Combined federal and state efforts provide \$2.3 billion for rental assistance as well as \$100 million in state aid to provide for hardship cases for landlords and renters that are outside of federal eligibility
 - Under the 2021-22 state budget guidelines for the Emergency Rental Assistance Program:
 - Initially, renters earning under 50% of AMI will be prioritized for eligibility to the program for the first 30 days.
 - Additional priority will be granted to households that have at least one member who has been unemployed for at least 90 days or more
 - Extends the covered period for mortgage forbearance to either Dec. 31, 2021, or until current rules that closed or restricted businesses due to COVID-19 are no longer in effect, whichever is later
 - Provides \$325 million in capital funds to housing authorities statewide, including \$200 million for the New York City Housing Authority (NYCHA) and \$125 million for other housing authorities

- Provides \$100 million to allow nonprofits to convert commercial properties and hotels in New York City into affordable residential housing for homeless and the most vulnerable.
- Allocates \$65.6 million in resources from the Housing Finance Agency (HFA) to support adult homeless shelters in New York City.
- Supporting New York families and raising much needed revenue:
 - Rejects an executive proposal to delay middle-class income tax cuts for one year
 - The tax cuts began in 2018 and are set to fully phase in by 2025
 - Saves middle-class homeowners \$400 million through a new property tax circuit breaker
 - Gives an income tax credit to taxpayers with incomes under \$250,000 that have property tax burdens that exceed 6% of their income
 - These benefits would be provided on a sliding scale, which would be based on a taxpayer's income, and would be capped at a maximum of \$350 per year
 - Provides \$40 million to extend the low-income housing tax credit for five years
 - Increases the existing top tax rate from 8.82% to 9.65% for those with incomes between \$1 million (\$2 million for joint filers) and \$5 million, to 10.3% for those with incomes between \$5 million and \$25 million and to 10.9% for those with incomes over \$25 million
 - Increases the corporate tax rate from 6.5% to 7.25% for corporate franchise taxpayers with incomes over \$5 million
 - The business tax proposals are expected to generate \$1.1 billion annually, while maintaining a smaller rate for smaller businesses
 - Overall, the new tax structure is estimated to generate \$3.5 billion in fiscal year 2021-2022 and \$4.3 billion in 2022-23
 - The final budget allows for mobile sports betting and sets up a competitive bidding process, overseen by the state Gaming Commission, to elicit proposals from potential mobile sports wagering platform providers
 - A minimum of two platform providers will be chosen
 - This is expected to raise \$99 million in the first year, increasing to \$493 million in fiscal year 2024-25
 - Requires a one-time \$25 million license fee per platform provider, and establishes a minimum tax rate of 12%
 - The actual tax rate will be determined pursuant to the competitive bidding process
 - Provides that mobile sports wagering revenue will be deposited into the state lottery fund for education aid
 - 1% of mobile sports wagering revenue will be deposited into the Commercial Gaming Fund for problem gambling education and treatment purposes.

- 1% of mobile sports wagering revenue will be deposited into the General Fund, which will then be appropriated for a statewide underserved youth sports activities and education grant program
- For every fiscal year thereafter, \$6 million will be directed to problem gambling education and treatment, and \$5 million will be directed to youth sports funding. **(Photo-A)**

It certainly has been an arduous year, yet I am honored to have worked with my colleagues and leadership to pass an equitable budget that will truly assist all the residents of the 61st Assembly District as we move forward with the recovery process from the COVID-19 pandemic.

Critical Updates, New Policies, and Testing Locations to Protect You and Your Community

1. **Effective April 11, 2021, MTA Bridges and Tunnels is discontinuing its Staten Island Resident carpool plan at the Verrazzano-Narrows Bridge (VNB)** The plan was intended to speed the payment of tolls at the VNB toll plaza via pre-paid tickets, while also encouraging carpooling as a means of reducing regional traffic. **However, the members of the State Majority Delegation once again, was able to keep the resident discount in tact where the rate will remain at \$2.75.**
2. **Empire Outlets, Ocean Breeze Athletic Complex to be walk-up vaccination sites for residents 75 and older.** “This is the group we need to reach most,” Mayor de Blasio said, referring to those aged 75 and older as a particularly vulnerable group. “Lots more outreach to be done to reach the oldest New Yorkers, like setting aside appointments at all city sites for seniors.
3. **Today the HALT Solitary Confinement Act (S.2836/A2277-A) was signed into law, reforming the practice of segregated confinement in New York State correctional facilities.** This legislation limits the amount of time an incarcerated person can spend in segregated confinement to 15 days, clearly defines and reduces the number of disciplinary infractions eligible for segregated confinement, and exempts certain

vulnerable populations, including the young, elderly, pregnant women, people with disabilities, and individuals with a serious mental illness.

4. **New York State is launching a new pilot program to begin administering the Johnson & Johnson's single-dose vaccine to eligible New Yorkers during the overnight hours at Yankee Stadium, Javits Center and New York State Fair Mass Vaccination Sites.** Following a discussion with the White House COVID-19 Task Force, New York is taking measures to distribute the state's allocation of the Johnson & Johnson vaccine as quickly as possible, as states have been informed there will be a lag in the following week's allocation. As part of this effort, thousands of new appointments will be made available at each of the three sites in the coming days. Counties, pharmacies, and Federally Qualified Health Centers will also be receiving Johnson & Johnson allocations this week.

CLIENT SUCCESS STORY

Ms. M., a 68-year-old Black homeowner, fell one month behind on her mortgage when she had to pay for her sister's funeral expenses. For one year, her mortgage company continued to accept her payments, but then her servicing was transferred to a new company. The new mortgage company refused to accept Ms. M.'s payments unless she could catch up on the one missed payment. For three years, Ms. M. tried to negotiate with her lender, but it refused to work with her even though she had sufficient income and was caring for her husband, who suffered from Alzheimer's disease. After being sued in foreclosure, Ms. M. was able to connect with Brooklyn Legal Services, who helped her negotiate a modification with a lower interest rate and more affordable monthly payment, saving her \$300 per month on her housing expenses and allowing her family to remain in their home.


