Legislation was signed into law this week, strengthening New York's gun laws. I was pleased to cosponsor and strongly support these Assembly bills, now law, to reduce and prevent gun violence.

Our office is advocating for the return of the Roosevelt Island stop on the MTA Mobile Sales Bus schedule. I sent a letter in strong support of the senior citizens and people with disabilities who need support in refilling their reduced fare cards and other MTA services, especially during the MetroCard-to-OMNY transition.

As Chair of the Aging Committee, I am sponsoring legislation for the deaf and hard of hearing community to access more movie screenings offering "open captions." Having "open captions" at theaters statewide will ensure that all New Yorkers can enjoy the movie-going experience.



Seawright Supports the New York Heat Act

Seawright Sponsors Open Caption Legislation for Deaf and Hard of Hearing New Yorkers



Hear from citizens across New York State about why the deaf and hard of hearing want to require cinemas statewide to offer open captioned movie showtimes.

Assembly Member Rebecca Seawright is sponsoring legislation to increase the opportunities for deaf and hard-of-hearing individuals to access movie screenings. On-screen closed captioning is necessary to ensure an equal viewing experience. The current closed captioning accommodation is inadequate because it requires viewers to read text from a handheld device that takes their attention away from the screen. This accommodation does not give viewers who use closed captioning equal access to movies. Improved accessibility at movie theaters will also benefit many community members, not just those who require the feature for accessibility. People with hearing loss, neurodiverse individuals, English-language learners, people who use ear protection, and many others use on-screen closed captioning.

Safety Laws

The following Assembly Bills cosponsored and strongly supported by Assembly Member Rebecca Seawright include:

- Assembly Bill 436 will ensure there are penalties for using "pistol converters," which are rapid-fire
 modification devices that can be easily attached to semi-automatic pistols to make them even
 deadlier by allowing rapid fire with one pull of the trigger.
- Assembly Bill 439 will strengthen the law that the Governor signed last year that requires credit
 and debit card issuers to use the merchant category code (MCC) for firearms and ammunition
 retailers by ensuring that it captures retailers whose bulk sales come from firearms, ammunition,
 and firearms accessories.
- Assembly Bill 437 strengthens the law the Governor signed last year that requires firearms dealers and gunsmiths to post and distribute at the time of sale information about the availability of the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline and warnings about the dangers of gun ownership, including increased risk of suicide, death during domestic disputes and unintentional death of children, household members, and others. By providing consumers with this Surgeon General-style warning, the law aims to promote the health and safety of the general public by educating and informing gun owners and potential buyers of the risks the weapons pose.

Additionally, there has been a \$370 million investment to reduce and prevent gun violence and strengthen communities disproportionately impacted by crime that includes, but is not limited to, the following programs and initiatives administered by DCJS:

- \$50 million through the Law Enforcement Technology grant program, which provides funding so
 police departments and sheriffs' offices can purchase new equipment and technology to
 modernize their operations and more effectively solve and prevent crime.
- \$36 million for GIVE, which funds the 28 police departments and district attorneys' offices, probation departments, and sheriffs' offices in 21 counties outside of New York City.
- \$21 million for the SNUG Street Outreach Program, which operates in 14 communities across the state: Albany, the Bronx, Buffalo, Hempstead, Mount Vernon, Newburgh, Niagara Falls, Poughkeepsie, Rochester, Syracuse, Troy, Utica, Wyandanch, and Yonkers. The program uses a public health approach to address gun violence by identifying the source, interrupting transmission, and treating individuals, families, and communities affected by the violence.
- \$18 million in continued support for the State's unique, nationally recognized Crime Analysis Center Network, and \$13 million in new funding to establish the New York State Crime Analysis and Joint Special Operations Command Headquarters, a strategic information, technical assistance, and training hub for 11 Centers in the State's network, and enhance existing partnerships and expand information sharing with the New York State Intelligence Center operated by the State Police, the locally run Nassau County Lead Development Center, and the State's Joint Security Operations Center, which focuses on protecting the State from cyber threats.
- \$20 million for Project RISE (Respond, Invest, Sustain, Empower) in 10 communities to support mentoring, mental health services, restorative practices, trust building, employment and education support, and youth development activities, among other programs and services.
- The New York State Police, the State Department of Corrections and Community Supervision, the State Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance, and the State Office of Victim Services also will receive funding through that \$370 million allocation.

Empire State Child Credit

The New York State Department of Taxation and Finance is issuing supplemental Empire State Child Credit payments to over 1.5 million low- and moderate-income New Yorkers. The 2024–2025 New York State budget provides for an additional payment to eligible taxpayers based on the Empire State child credit. If you qualify for a payment, you don't need to do anything; we will automatically calculate and send you a check for the amount you're entitled to. Energy Affordability Programs

The NYS Energy Affordability Program provides income-eligible consumers with a discount on their monthly electric and/or gas bills. You may be enrolled automatically if you receive benefits from a government assistance program. Regular HEAP Benefit

Health Insurance

HIICAP



Construction Advisory

Reconstruction of York Ave. Combined Sewer and Water Main Project

The NYC Department of Design and Construction (NYC DDC) manages the Reconstruction of York Avenue, Combined Sewer and Water Main Project ID# SEN002169, upgrading existing infrastructure facilities along York Avenue, between East 61st Street and East 63rd Street and on E. 62nd Street between York Avenue and 1st Avenue in the Upper East Side of Manhattan.

The city's scope includes replacing combined sewers, water mains, catch basins, fire hydrants, new street lighting, traffic signal upgrades, and full road restoration. Several of these operations have been delayed due to Con Edison's underground utility work, which requires extreme caution and hand-digging excavations. The anticipated completion date for this project is the summer of 2025. Please find the latest report here.
