Amy Paulin is, once again, one of the most productive legislators in Albany in 2018.

The New York State Legislature session has drawn to a close. Few members of the State Assembly have been as productive, as professional, and as focused on making real progress that will improve people's lives in ways large and small as Assemblymember Amy Paulin.

- Amy Paulin sponsored 19 bills in 2018 that passed both the State Assembly and the State Senate – the 4th most among all members of the Assembly.
- She passed an additional 16 bills in the State Assembly that did not pass the Senate – also the 4th most in the Assembly.
- She has consistently ranked in the top 3% of Assembly Members for the number of bills passing the Legislature.

Amy Paulin's commitment to working in a bipartisan and professional way has proven to be a winning result for her constituents and the people of New York State.

Amy Paulin has authored more than 200 bills that have been signed into law since she was first elected. **This year, 19 more bills passed both houses.**

Here are some highlights:

- Punishing those who profit from child sex trafficking to the maximum extent of the law while protecting the victims of human trafficking. (Ch. 189 of 2018)
- Requiring electric utility companies to provide an annual transparency statement so consumers may fully examine and better understand the charges on their bills. (A.8288-B)
- Preventing an unintended state tax increase of 9%, triggered by changes to federal tax law, on the commuter benefits nonprofit companies provide for their employees, including mass transit and parking fees. (A.11051)
- Requiring natural gas companies to report the location and severity of gas leaks to state and public safety officials. (A.467-A)

Additionally, when the final FY2018-2019 State Budget became law, it incorporated policies that Amy Paulin had previously proposed as stand-alone bills, including:

- Permitting New Yorkers to itemize their New York State tax returns, even if they do not itemize their federal returns.
- Actively working with municipalities, school districts, and counties to provide new options for taxpayers hit hard by the new federal cap on state and local tax deductions.
- Closing a loophole in state gun laws by requiring convicted domestic violence abusers to surrender their firearms.
