

New Laws Taking Effect – June 2021

6/1/2021	Ch. 55 of 2021 Part ZZ, Sec. 2	<u>A.3005-C</u> <u>S.2505-C</u>	Establishes a deer-hunting pilot program to allow 12- and 13-year-old licensed hunters to hunt deer.
6/1/2021	Ch. 57 of 2021 Part H, Sec. 3	<u>A.3007-C</u> <u>S.2507-C</u>	Eliminates consumer-paid premium payments for dental and vision under the Basic Health Program.
6/1/2021	Ch. 59 of 2021 Part G, Sec. 2	<u>A.3009-C</u> <u>S.2509-C</u>	Increases penalties for failure of an employer to provide complete and correct employee withholding information; applies to returns filed after June.
6/4/2021	Ch. 105 of 2021	<u>A.2681-B</u> <u>S.1034-B</u>	The Hero Act requires the Department of Labor, in consultation with the Department of Health to create a model airborne infectious disease exposure prevention plan to cover all private employers. Employers would then be required to adopt the model or similar standard.
6/13/2021	Ch. 323 of 2020 & Ch. 84 of 2021	<u>A.5630-A</u> <u>S.3923-A</u> <u>A.2353</u> <u>S.888</u>	Simplifies the statutory short form and other powers of attorney for purposes of financial and estate planning.
6/13/2021	Ch. 334 of 2020 & Ch. 18 of 2021	<u>A.3327</u> <u>S.2861</u> <u>A.981</u> <u>S.892</u>	Requires that prepaid cellular telephone cards have the expiration date or the expiration policy of the minutes purchased printed on the card in conspicuous print.
6/20/2021	Ch. 66 of 2021 Sec. 4	<u>A.1254</u> <u>S.1303</u>	Amends the Jonah Bichotte Cowan law to require hospitals to provide information and implement protocols for emergency medical conditions related to pregnancy including pre-term labor.
6/21/2021	Ch. 180 of 2020	<u>A.10634-B</u> <u>S.8641-A</u>	Clarifies the process for a physician to delegate trained staff to instill mydriatic or cycloplegic eye drops (dilating eye drops) and associated anesthetic eye drops to the surface of a patient's eye.

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6/29/2021	Ch. 382 of 2020 & Ch. 76 of 2021	<u>A.2680</u> <u>S.2558</u> <u>A.7463-B</u> <u>S.5348-B</u>	Enacts the Driver's License Suspension Reform Act to help individuals pay traffic fines and to prevent the suspension of driver's licenses for unpaid fines. It provides for a person to be notified when to make an appearance at a traffic hearing and requires income-based payment plans to be available for fines, fees and mandatory surcharges incurred as a result of a traffic violation.
