
My Visit to Extraordinary Ventures

Yesterday I had the wonderful opportunity to visit [Extraordinary Ventures New York](#), which provides meaningful employment opportunities for individuals with autism and other developmental disabilities. Based in Mount Kisco, EVNY operates three businesses: gifts (such as candles and bracelets), office solutions (including shredding services) and laundry services.

While there, I was given a tour by Executive Director Andrew Tedder, and met two of the organization's founders – Melanie and Drew Schaffran – whose son Brett (who I also met) is an EVNY employee. We were joined by Sara DuTerroil, a constituent who kindly brought this fantastic organization to my office's attention.

Reminder: Child Income-Tax Credit Begins July 15th

A reminder that payments on the temporarily-expanded federal tax credit, provided for the American Rescue Plan will begin on July 15th. Households representing more than 65 million children (88% of U.S. children) will qualify for this refundable tax credit.

Eligible families will receive a payment of up to \$300 per month for each child under age 6 (with a maximum annual credit of \$3,600 per child) and up to \$250 per month for each child between ages 6 to 17 (with a maximum annual credit of \$3,000 per child). The benefit begins to phase out beginning at incomes of \$150,000 for married couples, \$112,500 for a Head of Household single parent, and \$75,000 for single filers. The regular tax credit of \$2,000 (minus any payments received) remains in place for individuals whose income remains below \$200,000 for individuals and \$400,000 for couples.

Payments will be made via direct deposit, paper check or debit cards beginning July 15th and continuing on the 15th of each month through December. In addition to receiving these monthly payments (which represent the credit for the first half of the tax filing year 2020), recipients will receive the rest of their benefit as a credit next year when they file their 2021 tax returns.

Parents can also opt out of the monthly payments and instead receive the full, expanded credit on their tax returns next year.
