The 95th Assembly District has received grant awards totaling \$551,000 from the New York State Council for the Arts for fiscal year 2023! Congratulations to the following arts organizations:

Another congratulations to the Town of Ossining, which recently won a \$30,000 Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) grant to support its efforts to establish a swimming beach at Louis

Engel Park, with assistance from a local not-for-profit, the Hudson Valley Stream Conservancy. The funds will be used to identify sources of nonpoint source pollution and priority locations for water testing. The project will reduce pollution in an effort to open the beach for swimming once water quality has been restored.

ArtsWestchester is now accepting grant applications for the second round of its 2023 Arts Alive grant opportunity. Awards are available for community projects, individual artists, and educators, and the application is due **March 22**. Senator Schumer's office has sent us the following opportunities; contact Megan Glander at Megan Glander@schumer.senate.gov if you are interested in applying for any of these.

- The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has opened the portal for local governments to request technical assistance for its <a href="https://doi.org/10.25/">Thriving Communities technical assistance</a> (TCTA) program. This funding will help local governments who have received Federal transportation funding ensure housing needs are considered as part of their larger infrastructure investment plans, with a focus on disadvantaged communities. Units of Local Government can request technical assistance using <a href="https://doi.org/10.25/">this form</a>. If you applied to USDOT's Thriving Communities program and have a strong interest in addressing housing issues in your community, you are encouraged to also apply to HUD's Thriving Communities program. Requests will be reviewed as they are received on a rolling basis, with review beginning on March 15, 2023.
- The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is offering \$100 million in environmental justice funding through two new grant programs.
  - \$70 million is available through the <u>Environmental Justice Government-to-Government</u> (EJG2G) <u>Program</u>, which provides funding to support government activities that lead to measurable environmental or public health impacts in communities disproportionately

- burdened by environmental harms. Eligible entities include partnerships between a state, Tribe, or local government and a community-based nonprofit organization; and U.S. Territories, Freely Associated States, and tribal governments in remote areas. - Salo million is available through the Environmental Justice Collaborative Problem-Solving Cooperative Agreement (EJCPS) Program, which provides financial assistance to eligible organizations working to address local environmental or public health issues in their communities.†The program assists recipients in building collaborative partnerships with other stakeholders to develop solutions to environmental or public health issue(s) at the community level. Eligible entities include community-based nonprofit organizations and partnerships of community-based nonprofit organizations. View past webinar recordings and materials here. Applications are due by April 14, 2023.
- EPA has made available up to approximately \$550 million for its <a href="Environmental Justice Thriving Communities Grantmaking">Environmental Justice Thriving Communities Grantmaking</a> (EJ TCGM) Program. Through this program, EPA will fund up to 11 Grantmakers from around the nation to reduce barriers to the Federal grants application process and increase the efficiency of the awards process for environmental justice grants. Grantmakers will design competitive application and submission processes, award environmental justice subgrants, implement a tracking and reporting system, and provide resources and support to communities. Eligible applicants are community-based nonprofit organizations, partnerships between federally recognized Tribal governments and community-based nonprofit organizations, and partnerships between institutions of higher education and community-based nonprofit organizations. EPA is hosting an informational webinar on March 16 at 2:00-4:00 p.m. ET. <a href="Register here">Register here</a>. Applications are due by May 31, 2023.
- Applications for the <u>Buses and Bus Facilities Program</u> are due on **April 13, 2023**. Eligible applicants
  are designated recipients that allocate funds to fixed-route bus operators, States (including territories
  and Washington D.C.) or local governmental entities that operate fixed route bus service, and Indian
  tribes.
- Applications for the <u>Low or No Emission Vehicle Program</u> are due **April 13, 2023**. Eligible applicants
  are designated recipients of FTA grants, including states, local governmental authorities, and Indian
  Tribes.
